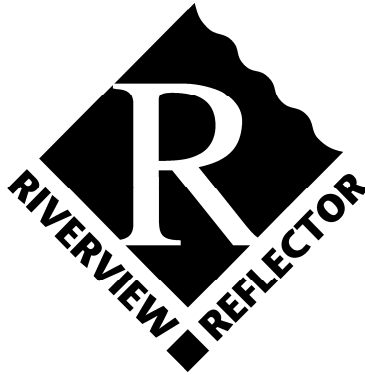

Who is delivering my Reflector in -40 weather?

This past year, the Riverview Community Centre changed its method for delivering the Reflector. Until recently, the Reflector advertising coordinator (Ellen Funk) would pick up the Reflectors from the print, bring them home, count them into about 15 or more groups for different delivery routes within Riverview, put the Reflectors in bags, label the bags with delivery person name, route name, and number of Reflectors, deliver the bags to each delivery person's home, write cheques for each delivery person (cheques were usually in amounts between \$5 and \$10 each) and deliver the cheques to each delivery person's home. The delivery persons were neighbourhood children, who were paid between \$0.05 and \$0.08 per house over the past few years. The children frequently changed over, so that almost every Reflector issue we needed to find one or more new kids to deliver the Reflectors. So we decided a change was needed.

Tom McMahon's wife, Kelly Klick, used to work in the area of supported employment, so Tom wondered whether it might be possible to find a new delivery person (or a few) who could deliver to the neighbourhood through the support employment community. Tom contacted Premier Personnel who put Tom and Ellen in touch with Terry Linn Johnson. Terry Linn is now our only delivery person, delivers to the entire neighbourhood, every time. It usually takes her between four and five days to deliver to every house. When someone says to her: "no flyers please", she says "it's not a flyer, it's your community newsletter".

Terry Linn is 45 years old. She is currently busy with school, trying to finish her grade 11, and takes figure skating lessons through Special Olympics. In fact, Terry Linn has been busy with Special Olympics for 22 years. When she began with Special Olympics, it was with cross-country skiing. She went to Edmunston, New Brunswick, Reno, Nevada, Collingwood, Ontario, and Calgary, Alberta all for cross-country skiing. She also went to New Haven, Connecticut and Halifax for track and field. Now, she is involved in swimming, bowling and figure skating.

Terry Linn was born in Winnipeg and raised on a small hobby farm near Anola, with her three brothers and two sisters. Her oldest sister has 13 children of her own, so Terry Linn has 23 nephews and nieces.

Terry Linn has worked various jobs over the years, including her strangest, washing semi-trucks. Terry Linn says her favourite job is delivering the Reflector. She says thank you for this job, she really enjoys it. Recently, different people have stopped her on the street to ask if she is warm enough, and one person even invited her in for a cup of coffee. Now that she is getting known to the neighbourhood, she also delivers flyers for the Park Theatre and Cafe, and for Ziggy's Comics.

Her biggest challenge with the job is the snow on the sidewalk. Terry Linn uses a rolling cart and when the sidewalks are not cleared, she has to use the streets, which she says can get scary when the cars come. Terry Linn lives at Webb Place and enjoys the convenience of being close to everything, including being able to walk to Tom's office to pick up cheques!

It seems as though Riverview and Terry Linn are a good fit for each other. Next time you see Terry Linn delivering the Reflector on your street, give her a nice hello.

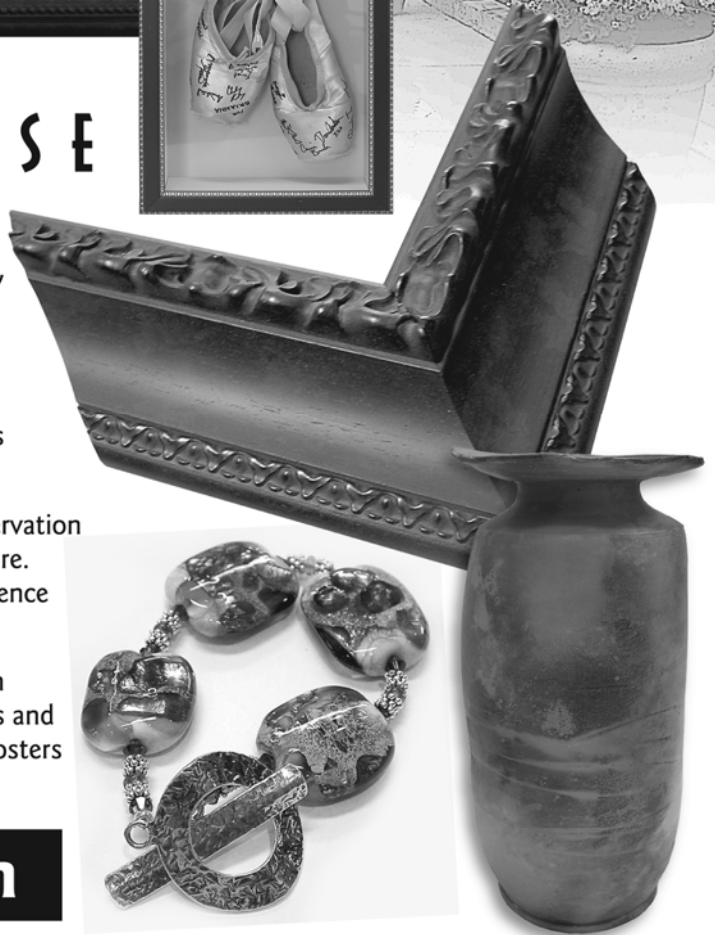

Cool Jobs in the Hood

Riverview has a lot of remarkable people, Jim Siddall is one of them. His cool job? You tell me. Maybe it's just social activist. Jim has lived in Riverview for 11 years. He grew up in Pine Falls, where his dad was the town doctor, who delivered 3,000 babies during his time there. Jim went to work at the paper mill, framed in cabins, and later got into hotel administration, helped open Olive Garden restaurants in Manitoba, and owned a small chain of body care retail stores. In that capacity, he became a member of the Chamber of Commerce and was President of the Merchants Association at the Forks.

Then his mom died of alcoholism and Jim decided to change his path. He took charge of food production for Meals on Wheels at the Health Sciences Centre (where he met his wife, a dietician now moving into the business world), graduated from the Applied Counselling Certificate Program, and became a counsellor at Addictions Foundation of Manitoba.

Since then Jim has worked at the Salvation Army in the mobile crisis unit as a suicide intervention counselor and ran the Level 5 Psychiatric Ward at the Salvation Army. He became involved with New Directions, with supported apartment living, worked with the West Broadway Neighbourhood Housing Resource Centre, is nearing completion of his Bachelor of Social Work degree, and sits on the screening committee for new applicants to the BSW program.



Jim is also a member of the Winnipeg Social Planning Council and sits on the SPC's Poverty Advisory Committee and Campaign 2000 to address child poverty issues. Jim has volunteered to write some articles for the Reflector (last month he wrote about pan-handling). So there you have it - successful businessman turned social activist. Cool job Jim!

Social Planning Council

The Social Planning Council (SPC) of Winnipeg was founded in the turmoil preceding the Winnipeg General Strike of 1919. In this period of Winnipeg's history there was no organized frame work in dealing with social reform issues such as race relations, poverty, labor disputes and living wages paid to employees by employers. The rapid evolution of industrialization was upon Canada and these issues were approaching the boiling point. Business recessions of 1873 to 1879, 1884 to 1887, 1893 to 1896, and again in 1914 to 1915 sparked resentment among workers who had little or no protection around wages and work safety issues from exploiting employers. The mass influx of immigration also caused stress in the city as immigrants were willing to work for less pay than newly formed labor associations.

A group of citizens came together to identify and address the problems of a society undergoing rapid change. They formed the Community Welfare Council, precursor of the SPC. Unfortunately the social unrest broke out into the violent riots of the Winnipeg General Strike and had to be put down by the military police. This was a wake up call for not only the City of Winnipeg but the Provincial and Federal government in taking action to find real solutions to the social issues of the period born out of industrialization.

One may appreciate the high level of stress between workers and employers during this period in history. Canada had no unemployment assistance, no health coverage for the poor, no disability insurance, no family allowance, no housing safety standards and no minimum wage legislation. The Old Age Pension Act was the only piece of legislation to deal with social issues created by rapid industrialization.

Today the SPC operates in a unique role as a non-partisan organization which is rich in social science and human resources, ideally situated as a vehicle for citizens to explore and assess controversial issues, bring new information into public debate and help form a public consensus around progressive solutions. The challenges of race relations and discrimination still exist today with challenges of gang violence, unemployment and underemployment and continued high rates of child and adult poverty.

A primary role of the SPC in providing social change for the better is to provide information that is fact based and impartial. It is through dispelling persistent historical ingrained myths regarding social issues that we may move forward to a just, caring, inclusive and responsive society. The SPC strives to identify and define social planning issues, needs and resources in the community. They work to develop and promote policy and program options to policy makers at the city, provincial and federal levels of government. Through bringing community members, social and business institutions and government together at the same table enables different views to be heard and influences positive policy change to happen.

On a personal note I am a standing member of the SPC and sit or have sat on the Poverty Advisory Committee (PAC), The Committee for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (CERD) and Campaign 2000 for the elimination of child poverty. My third quarter practicum rotation was done at the SPC as I finish my Bachelor of Social Work Degree. Previous to pursuing my social work career I was in business for sixteen years in food service and owning a small chain of retail stores. I am fortunate to bring a unique perspective to the advocacy, formation and implementation of sound social policy in hopes to benefit all individuals in our city. I believe each one of us can make a change for the better if we make the choice to advocate and get involved. I still believe government works for the people and not the reverse.

Hair Styles

Call to order at 7:45 pm.

Adoption of Agenda

MOTION: the agenda be adopted as presented, moved by Jamie Giasson, seconded by Hugo Bergen, passed unanimously.

Adoption of Minutes from Previous Meeting

MOTION: the minutes of the previous meeting be approved as presented, moved by Mike Schulz, seconded by Lori Keith, passed unanimously.

Reports

Cross Country Skiing Report

Jamie presented a proposal with some options for the drag machine, including leaving equipment as is and losing volunteers, buying a used machine to share parts with, investing in re-building the motor, and buying a newer machine.

Discussion regarding the options, and suggestions for fund-raising thrown out, including applying for a fund-raising bingo from Sport Manitoba.

MOTION: to provide Jamie with permission to start raising funds to be specifically earmarked for the purpose of re-building the motor, carburetor, etc. (as per Option 3 of his proposal), moved by Bev Suek, seconded by Lori Keith, passed unanimously.

President's Report

Jim presented Tom's written report.

MOTION: that RVCC formally support the principal of locally based community centres in which volunteers are available to provide leadership and co-ordination, moved by Bev Suek, seconded by Mike Schulz, passed unanimously.

Zamboni project - \$25K has been spent to date, \$7,600 cheque just arrived as part of the reimbursement. Some receipts are yet to be collected and followed up on. It is estimated that another \$3,000 will be required to complete the project.

MOTION: to reimburse Loren Brown for \$350 worth of used goalie equipment purchased by him for the club, as and when the club is financially able moved by Guido Cerasani, seconded by Lori Keith.

Treasurer's Report

Transfer Fees - Angela to ask Arlene for passwords to get ITSportsNet; Mike to speak to Norm Stewart (soccer convenor during the years in dispute, 2003, 2004 and 2005).

Suggested that Tom could raise concerns regarding the transfer fee protocol with GCWCC.

Still waiting for GST rebate of approximately \$5,000, and second half of fund drive monies back from the City.

MOTION: to accept the financial statements for the month ended December 31, 2006, as presented, moved by Lori Keith, seconded by Angela Hilland.

Hockey Report

Guido reported that there are a few revenues and expenses coming up in the near future, such as ice time fees, sock fees, etc. Net profit is projected to be just over \$3,000,

less incidentals such as goalie pads, etc. We're running four teams out of Riverview and it is great to see all of the activity around here on the evenings and weekends!
